AOPA LOCAL UPDATE CONCORD JET PERMIT APPROVED By Dave Evans

After much work by all parties involved, the impasse between the Fire Marshal and Concord Jet with regard to their building permit for an expansion of their facilities has been resolved without the need for foam fire suppression systems and a set of guidelines has been developed for fire suppression requirements for all future hangar developments on the field.

Under these guidelines, only hangars intended for major aircraft maintenance operations will need to employ foam systems and a detailed list of activities that are not to be considered as major aircraft maintenance has been generated. The majority of the currently planned developments on the field will be exempt from the foam system requirement and so yet another impediment to development on the field has been removed.

Special thanks should go to Keith Freitas and his staff for developing the crucial list of non-major maintenance activities which is not only consistent with local build codes but with FAA definitions as well.

A formal ground breaking ceremony for the new Concord Jet facilities will be held on Tuesday, March 20, at 10:30am.

HELP WITH AOPA'S CAMPAIGN TO STOP FAA USER FEES

By now, you should know that we're in the fight of our lives against the FAA-airlines' user fee proposal. Over the last several weeks, there have been a number of articles in AOPA ePilot, AOPA Online, and AOPA Pilot magazine about this serious issue facing general aviation. GA pilots will face incredible increases in the cost of flying if we do not prevail.

- * Increase in the tax on avgas fourfold to 70 cents a gallon
- * 13 new or increased fees that would affect pilots, aircraft owners, and mechanics at various times, including fees for use of Class B airspace
- * Reduce the general fund share of the FAA's budget
- * Cut Airport Improvement Program funding by 21 percent

Here's what you can do about it now:

EDUCATE YOURSELF ON THE ISSUES

The process has already begun and will be resolved before October 2007 when Congress approves the budget for the new Federal fiscal year. Go to "The FAA Funding Debate and User Fees." (Http://www.aopa.org/faaf-undingdebate/ on the AOPA web site.) There you'll find all the information you need to follow the debate and understand the issues. Be sure and follow the links at the bottom of each page to go to the next point in the discussion.

CONTACT CONGRESS

As Phil Boyer covered in his open letter to members (http://www.aopa.org/whatsnew/newsitems/2007/070220funding.html), AOPA will be asking members to contact Congress at key times as the FAA funding issue progresses through the legislative process. Go to "Contacting Congress" (http://www.aopa.org/faafundingde-bate/congress/) to see when to contact Congress and how to do it. A faxed letter written on your personal or business letterhead followed up by a mailed copy is most effective. Please be sure to fax (301/695-2372) or mail AOPA a copy of any letter you send or response you receive from your representative.
