During our morning club discussion I tried to focus on topics that typically do not get a lot of attention and can be daunting for beginning pilots (and the rest of us as well). We had a round table type

discussion about, when to file a flight plan, how and when to best use flight following, how to get a good flight briefing, and other resources that can be used for flight planning like Flight Watch and online tools that are available. We had great participation with excellent comments and experiences being shared by many of the MDPA members. It really demonstrated the wealth of knowledge within the club and how powerful and important it can be to share and exchange this collective experience.

After fueling up with the standard MDPA breakfast, we placed the students with our volunteer pilots. A big thanks to: Scott Davis, Bob Weiss, Bob Tucknott, Pete Mollinas & John Potter. Auburn was the destination

I'd like to add to John's post above and share one of the most amazing and unforgettable experiences I had that day when flying to Auburn. Bill Austin kindly offered me a front seat in his beautiful classic yellow open cockpit biplane - 1942 Boeing Stearman. Here is a little bit of history: Stearman Model 75 was used as a military trainer aircraft, of which at least 10,626 were built in the United States during the 1930s and 1940s. Stearman Aircraft became a subsidiary of Boeing in 1934. Widely known as the Stearman, Boeing



Stearman or Kaydet, it served as a primary trainer for the USAAF, the USN, and with the RCAF as the



Kaydet throughout World War II. After the conflict was over, thousands of surplus aircraft were sold on the civilian market. In the immediate postwar years they became popular as crop dusters, sports planes, and for aerobatic and wing walking use in airshows.

I can only compare that flying experience to the day when I first soloed. And although I am no longer a student pilot, I felt like one, after my first landing – very happy, excited and thrilled! I got to wear a jumpsuit, a helmet and a parachute, also added a scarf to my uniform – just to look like pilots in those old pictures ©

Flying in an open cockpit makes you experience new sensations no other type of flying can provide. It makes you look at flying from a totally different perspective. You can stretch out your hand and feel the wind blowing through your fingers. You can smell the fresh air and wave to the birds flying by.
