SAFETY FORUM

The Moderator, David Thacker, first described his participation in the Salinas AOPA regional gathering. He explained that he had volunteered to work at the event but the weather on the fly-in date was below his minimums. So, he decided to fly Young Eagles at Nut Tree Airport in sunny weather. MDPA Members whom attended the AOPA fly-in decided to drive to the event and they reported most other attendees did likewise due to the marginal weather.

He then got into the topic of pilot behavior when another pilot is in the airplane---mainly complacency and letting events progress without monitoring the potential for making mistakes, like entering an incorrect pattern or landing the wrong way on a runway.

He asked if pilots checked NOTAMS for their destination before departing and in general there was a "not always" response. He noted that recently there were many flyers intending to land at Nut Tree to buy low priced fuel and they were 'surprised' to find the airport runways closed due to construction when they tried to land. NOTAM information is not included in ASOS broadcasts. ALWAYS CHECK NOTAMS!

MDPA MEETING AND DINNER, FRIDAY, JUNE 19, 6:30PM



Our speaker in June was Sue Clarke, a member of Pilots N Paws, who gave a very interesting story about some of their rescue missions. One of our own MDPA members Maurice Gunderson also belongs to that group, but I am sad to say he is what is known as a "failed rescuer". See his story below, together with a photo of Fargo.

"As you know we have been flying for PnP for about two years. This May I signed up to fly a mission from Hanford to Petaluma. It was an Australian cattle dog mix that had been found stray on the streets in Hanford. A lady named Yvonne discovered him, carefully lured him to her, took him to the vet, and took him home.

Yvonne then contacted Marina Harrison at "Herd It Through The Grapevine", a cattle dog rescue group in Petaluma. Marina agreed to take him and posted the mission on PnP. She also called me and asked if I would fly the mission, as I had flown several dogs for her



Marina and his foster mom Lori Anderson. I really liked Fargo and it was very difficult to fly away and leave him.

On the short flight home from Petaluma to KCCR I realized that Fargo was destined to be our dog. When I got in the car I called Rebecca and she agreed, so I



previously. So off I went to Hanford where I met Yvonne and Fargo. (His name comes from the street in Hanford where he was found).

I flew him to Petaluma and handed him over to



called Marina right back and told her we wanted to adopt Fargo. Good thing I acted fast, because two other families had already expressed interest in him.

Fargo stayed with his foster Lori for about two weeks for the required waiting period and while he got his vet work completed. Rebecca drove to see Fargo at Lori's house every day (140 mile round trip) so he would know her by the time we brought him home. Finally on June 5 we brought him home.

I know that PnP refers to this as a "failed mission," where the animal gets adopted by the pilot. But for us it has been a great success!"
